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

AG EXHIBIT RULES

1. Exhibits can be entered between 5:00 p.m. and 8:00 p.m. on Wednesday, July 20, and between 8:00 a.m. and 11:30 a.m. on Thursday, July 21, at the exhibit office at the front gate.

2. Judging of exhibits will be conducted on Thursday, July 21.

3. If only one entry is exhibited in a class, it will be judged and awarded on merit.

4. The Pulaski County Fair Board will make efforts to see that entries remain unharmed, but does not assume responsibility for loss or damage.

5. Exhibitors must leave items on display through Saturday, July 23. Items must be collected Monday, July 25, 2021 between 9:00 a.m. and Noon. Claim checks must be taken to Fair Board office, above the concession stand, upon arrival for pick up. If other arrangements are necessary, contact the fair office. Premium checks can be picked up with exhibits on Monday.

6. There will be no charge to anyone for entering 4-H, FFA and Open divisions.

7. Premium checks must be cashed within 30 days of issue.

8. Entries in 4-H and FFA classes must have been produced in conjunction with an approved project.

9. Open classes are open to all exhibitors unless otherwise specified.

10. No animals, except service animals and livestock for show day.

OPEN CLASS (FOR THE GENERAL PUBLIC - ANYONE CAN ENTER)

No entry may be exhibited for judging which has been displayed at the Pulaski County Fair in previous year.

Persons are limited to one item per category. All items must be original work made by the exhibitor during the past year. Ribbons will be awarded on merit. Prize money: \$5 for first, \$2 for second, \$1 for third unless otherwise specified.

Pulaski County Extension Homemakers Council Meeting

June 27, 2022

Opening: The meeting was called to order by President Mary Ellis at noon. Members said the Pledge of Allegiance to the American flag. After the food was blessed by Edith Lovett, everyone enjoyed lunch from Cracker Barrel. Members in attendance included Betty Waddle, Pamela Surber, Mary Ellis, Bessie Loveless, Sheila Adams, Donna Wheeldon, Sherry Hoffer, Barbara Moore, Jana Brown, Emily Branscum, Charline Marrinan, Denise Salter, Debbie Peppers, Sheilah Childers, Shell Bader, Barbara Bean-Slagle, Cathy Smith, and Edith Lovett.

Minutes: Everyone read over the minutes from April 11. It was corrected that each homemaker group would bring **four** dozen hamburger buns and four dozen homemade cookies for the Ovarian Cancer Screening Fundraiser. They were filed as corrected.

Treasurer's Report: Denise Salter said her report was the same as the one presented at the annual meeting. The raffle baskets brought in \$557. Not all silent auction items were picked up and paid for. When they are, the total received can be reported. The amount from ticket sales had not been finalized.

County Annual Meeting: The Not So Pampered Chefs organized the annual meeting well. Edith Lovett wants everyone to fill out an evaluation sheet today if they didn't last Thursday. The results from the evaluation responses were discussed from the printed sheet. Debbie Peppers moved that homemaker groups add the name of their club to their name tag for next year's annual meeting. Pam Surber seconded it, and the motion passed. Donna Wheeldon moved that we get a committee to do next year's annual meeting, and divide up the different jobs between the different homemaker clubs. Denise Salter seconded it, and the motion passed.

Scholarship Committee: Mary Ellis asked for volunteers to select the scholarship recipient from the applications turned in by July 1. Sheila Adams, Jana Brown, and Barbara Slagle were accepted to serve. The scholarship is \$600, split between two semesters.

Ovarian Cancer Fundraiser: Emily Branscum said that we will have an Ovarian Cancer Screening Fundraiser on Thursday, September 29, for \$10. The meal will include a barbecue sandwich, chips, slaw, homemade cookies, and a bottle of water. The meals can be delivered to a location if 10 or more meals are ordered, or they can be picked up at the Extension Office. Each homemaker group should donate four dozen hamburger buns, and four dozen homemade cookies. The cookies should be packaged two to a bag, or one larger cookie bar to a bag. More details will be shared at the next council meeting in August. Edith Lovett said she would get the water. If anyone can get other donations, let Emily know. A letter or pamphlet about ovarian cancer will be included in the bags, and the people who donated items will be printed, also.

Holiday Tasting Luncheon: On Friday, July 29, each club is asked to have a representative from their club to attend the planning workshop for the Holiday Tasting Luncheon. This group will meet at 11:00 o'clock in the office basement. Susan Hansford and Sandy Woodman are co-chairpersons of this group. Bring ideas for the venue and theme to the meeting.

Holiday Bazaar: Denise Salter doesn't want to be the chairperson for this event. Debbie Peppers moved that we have the bazaar at the Somerset Mall, if it is available. Donna Wheeldon seconded it, and the

motion passed. Shell Bader moved that we have the bazaar on November 5, at the mall. Donna Wheeldon seconded it, and the motion passed. Edith Lovett said she will talk to Carol at the mall.

Homemaker Dues: Our dues are \$11 now. The state has raised their dues from \$4 to \$5, which means we will be sending them an extra dollar. The dues collected help the state, area, and help the county by giving free classes for homemakers, help with postage on newsletters, to name a few items the dues goes toward. Denise Salter moved that we increase our dues to \$12. Jana Brown seconded it, and the motion passed. Denise also moved that all dues should be in to the office by October 1. Sheila Adams seconded it, and the motion passed.

Officer Training: The area president has a certain day that she trains. We do not have that date yet.

Lesson Training: All lesson training sessions are on the fourth Monday at 1 p.m. for the following month.

Creative Days: Wayne County will be having Creative Days on July 21-23. The fees are due each day. Each class is different.

Edith Lovett's Report: The Pulaski County Fair will be July 18-23. Cultural Arts items may be entered, baked goods, and garden vegetables. She doesn't know if she will be taking the van to the state fair, until her shoulder improves. All volunteer hours are due July 1. An individual needs 500 hours, and a club needs 1000 hours to turn in. Edith is happy to be back at work.

Jana Brown recommended that the standing rules should change the dues to \$12 which are due October 1. She suggested that we also add that an annual meeting committee will be appointed by the president for one year.

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Berry and Basil Pizza Crisp with Honey Balsamic

Balsamic Honey Glaze: ½ cup balsamic vinegar 3 tablespoons honey

Flatbread:

6 flatbreads
12 pieces of cheese, such as Havarti (2 per flatbread)
1 cup blackberries, halved 1 ½ cups strawberries, chopped

15 basil leaves, chopped and divided

Preheat oven to 400°F. Place

flatbreads on a baking sheet and add two slices Havarti cheese, blackberries, and strawberries. **Bake** for 5-7 minutes, or until cheese is melted. After flatbreads are removed from oven, add chopped basil and honey balsamic glaze. **Serve** warm.

To make the glaze: Add balsamic vinegar and honey to a small sauce pan and **simmer** until reduced by half (10-15 minutes). **Remove** from heat and **set aside**.

Serves: 6 Flatbreads
