<u>Pulaski County Extension Homemakers Annual Meeting</u> <u>June 24, 2024</u>

The Pulaski County Extension Homemakers celebrated their County Annual Meeting with the theme "Birds & Bees," on Monday, June 24, 2024, at the Hal Rogers Fire Training Center. Registration began at 5 p.m. and members could buy raffle tickets, bid on Silent Auction items, socialize, and enjoy light snacks. Mary Ellis, County President, called the meeting to order at 5:30 p.m. She introduced the guest on the platform, Mary Lynn Chaudoin, the president of the Lake Cumberland Area Extension Homemakers. Sheila Adams, the county vice president, led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Edith Lovett, extension agent for family and consumer science, introduced her boss, Jeff Casada, Area Extension Director of East 1 & 2. Mary Ellis pinned an Honorary Hinkle Belles name tag on him. He brought greetings from the Extension Office. He said he appreciated all of the volunteer hours that clubs did in the community.

Mary Ellis then called a representative from each club to come up front so the name tags could be judged. The table decorations had also been judged.

Mary asked the present secretary, Debbie Peppers, to come up. She was presented with a Thank You card and \$25 for her seven years as county secretary. Mary then asked for nominations for a new secretary. Sheila Adams nominated Trina Evans from the Hilltoppers. Due to no other nominations, she was accepted unanimously. She could not be in attendance due to helping with he mother in another state.

Mary then asked everyone to read over the minutes printed in their booklet. Sheila Adams moved to accept the minutes as printed. Kay Denham seconded it, and the motion passed. Mary said that her first term as president was finished, and that a new president needed to be elected. Denise Mayfield nominated Mary Ellis for a second term. Sue New seconded it, and she was approved.

The By Laws had been reviewed by Jana Brown, Sheila Adams, and Mary Ellis. A new part was added that a President Elect should be elected one year prior to the president's term ending and serve one year with the president. Then, that person will take over after the annual meeting when the president's term is over. Pam Young moved that the By Laws be accepted. Betty Waddle seconded it, and the motion passed.

Sheila Adams will continue to serve as vice president, and Kim Toby will continue as treasurer. Next, Mary Ellis asked Edith Lovett to give a devotion before the meal. Edith played the song, "Birds & Bees" sung by Dean Martin from her phone. Then, Mary asked the guests to go through the buffet line first, and directed the other groups to follow as she directed. The food was catered by Diamonds and Divas. After eating, members continued to visit, buy raffle tickets for the baskets donated by the homemaker clubs, bid on Silent Auction items, and have group photos made. Clubs who received Holiday Tasting grants last year had display boards for viewing.

After the meal, Mary Ellis asked the treasurer, Kim Toby, to present the budget for the upcoming year. Denise Salter moved that the budget be accepted as proposed, Sheilah Childers seconded it, and the motion passed. Mary thanked Sheilah Childers and the other staff members at the office for their work.

Mary Ellis recognized Kelsey Haste as last year's scholarship winner, and she was the recipient again this year. Kelsey came up and said that she really appreciated the scholarship. She said that she was a junior at the University of Kentucky and was in pre-dental. She used the money for books, and had to work less, because of the extra money, and could spend more time volunteering at the Ronald McDonald House and other places.

Next, Mary announced the winners of the Holiday Tasting Grants. She said they had a score sheet with certain criteria. The clubs with the highest points all received the same amount of money for the grants. The winners were the Hinklebelles, Meadowlarks, Just Among Friends, Pieceful Quilters, Material Girls, Cards R Us, Roundabouts, and East Somerset. Next, Mary announced the Homemaker of the Year as Susan Hansford. Then, she announced the Club of the Year as Just Among Friends.

Mary Ellis recognized the Mailbox Members as helping throughout the year. The clubs that have been in existence for 50 plus years, were the Nearby Neighbors, the Roundabouts, East Somerset, and the Moonlighters.

Emily Branscum and Denise Salter are co-chairpersons for the Holiday Tasting. It will be in the Fellowship Hall at the First Baptist Church on November 15, during the day. One person from each homemaker club should be present at each meeting. The first meeting is at the Extension Office on Monday, July 8, at 2 p.m. If your club does not participate in some way, you cannot receive a grant from the money raised at the event.

Next, club secretaries from each homemaker club were given a certificate for their work throughout the year. Jane Meece came up to give certificates to the members with the most volunteer hours last year. She reminded everyone to fill out their volunteer hours and turn in by July 5. The ones with the most Extension Hours were Melinda Hutchison with 187 hours, Mary Ellis with 86.5 hours, and Jane Meece with 85.6 hours. For KEHA hours, Debbie Peppers had 197.5 hours, Mary Ellis had 133 hours, and Kay Mounce had 95 hours. For Community Hours, Kay Mounce had 354 hours, Debbie Peppers had 308 hours, and Sharon Fields had 170 hours. For Personal Hours, Jane Meece had 494.1 hours, Mary Ellis had 436 hours, and Marsha Vanhook had 151.3 hours. The ladies with more than 500 hours overall, were Mary Ellis with 730.5 hours, Jane Meece with 677.2 hours, Debbie Peppers with 633.5 hours, and Kay Mounce with 629 hours. Agent Edith Lovett read the names of the members who had passed away during the year. They were Voni Pierce,

Jana Brown announced the raffle basket winners. Next, Debbie Peppers thanked everyone for turning in coupons for the troops. She requested that all coupons be cut out, and categorized in sandwich bags as Food, Non-food, Children, or Pets. They are good up to three months outdated. If you need any sandwich bags, she has plenty to recycle.

Next, Jennifer Weddle announced the Silent Auction winners. She reminded everyone to pay before they left. If you donated any items that were not bid on, pick them up to take back home.

Lake Cumberland Area president, Mary Chaudoin, announced the winner of the best name tag as the Not So Pampered Chefs. The Hinklebelles received the title of the best decorated table. Each club received \$25.

Debbie Peppers drew names for the door prizes. They included four flowers in plastic hangers to go on a fence, two hanging flower pots, two vases with live flowers, and another donated item.

Sheila Adams led everyone in the Homemaker Creed. Then, Mary asked members to fill out the evaluation form that was inserted in the program booklet, and to return it to the registration table as they left. Tomato Corn Pesto Pizza

3 plum or Roma tomatoes
 ¼ teaspoon onion powder
 ¼ teaspoon freshly ground or seasoned pepper
 ½ cup basil pesto
 1 (14-16 ounce) whole

wheat or regular packaged pre-baked pizza crust, thin crust % cup fresh corn kernels 1/2 cup grated Parmesan cheese

 1 teaspoon honey
 4 ounces shredded mozzarella cheese
 3 tablespoons fresh whole or torn basil leaves, (optional)

Preheat oven to 450 degrees F. Slice tomatoes into ¼ inch slices; place tomato slices on paper towels; sprinkle with onion powder and pepper; let stand 20 minutes. Spread pizza crust with pesto. Stir together corn kernels, Parmesan cheese and honey. Top pizza with corn mixture, tomato slices and mozzarella cheese. Place pizza directly on middle oven rack; bake

approximately 12-14 minutes or until cheese is melted and golden. **Remove** from oven and **top** with fresh basil leaves, if desired. Cut into 8 slices.

Yield: 8 servings, 1 slice each **Nutritional Analysis:** 290 calories, 13 g fat, 4.5 g saturated fat, 15 mg cholesterol, 590 mg sodium, 29 g carbohydrate, 2 g fiber, 3 g sugar, 14 g protein.
